## From Tommy Fankhauser IMC Director



### Retractable gear LESSONS—not just for RG pilots

The tired old saying is that "there are those who have, and those who will" have a gear-up landing. The record certainly makes this seem true. My Beech Weekly Accident Update (published concurrently with FLYING LESSONS Weekly at www.mastery.flight.training.com) lists six landing gear-related mishaps (LGRMs) in the last week and a half (I missed publishing last week).

Several years ago I did a 28-month study of the rate of LGRMs across the entire piston engine fleet. The issues is not limited to Beech airplanes—in fact, other types had a worse record. Fleetwide, based on estimates from the insurance industry at the time, I concluded that *the aviation insurance industry continues to pay on average well over \$1 million every month in LGRM claims...* a figure 25% higher in 2021 dollars. No wonder RG airplane insurance rates are so high.

**As I studied the record** I found there are several distinct sets of circumstances involved in virtually all gear up (the "oops, I forgot" type) and gear collapse (the gear was down but did not stay down) accidents. Comparatively few of them are such that the pilot could not land normally, perhaps after an abnormal (emergency procedures checklist) extension. In retrospect, almost all LGRMs were predictable and avoidable.

**I even won** sponsorship from the Wolff Aviation Fund (a now-defunct benevolent charity that funded aviation safety projects) to video and publish a DVD outlining these patterns and how to recognize and avoid them.

Those Who Won't: Avoiding Gear Up and Gear Collapse Mishaps is still out there (sold on the American Bonanza Society website), and although the presentation is dated the information is just as valid today.

**But I promised** to derive a *LESSON* from the LGRM record that applies to pilots in fixed gear airplanes as well. Look at some of the non-LGRM accidents reported on the FAA's preliminary reports website in the past two weeks:

- --ON DEPARTURE, WING CLIPPED A CACTUS AND GROUND LOOPED INTO A DITCH
- --AIRCRAFT ATTEMPTED TO GO AROUND AND LANDED IN A WOODED AREA
- --AIRCRAFT ABORTED TAKEOFF AND WENT OFF END OF R/W AND STRUCK A FENCE
- --AIRCRAFT LANDED ON A CLOSED RUNWAY AND SLID OFF THE END

### **IMC/VMC CONTINUED**

- --AIRCRAFT LANDED ON THE BEACH AND INCURRED A PROP STRIKE WHILE TAXIING
- --AIRCRAFT EXPERIENCED A GUST OF WIND ON LANDING AND VEERED OFF RUNWAY INTO A SNOWBANK AND FLIPPED OVER
- --AIRCRAFT TAXIING AND STRUCK A TAXIWAY LIGHT
- --AIRCRAFT CAUGHT A GUST OF WIND, LANDED HARD AND INCURRED RIGHT WING AND TAIL STRIKE
- --WHILE EXITING THE RUNWAY, AIRCRAFT STRUCK A TAXIWAY LIGHT
- --WHILE LANDING, AIRCRAFT VEERED OFF LEFT SIDE OF RUNWAY
- --AIRCRAFT TAXIING, VEERED OFF TAXIWAY AND BECAME STUCK IN THE MUD
- --AIRCRAFT LANDED ON TAXIWAY DUE TO STRONG WINDS AND STRUCK THE GROUND WITH LEFT WING

There were many more in the last two weeks.

What's a common link between these events and landing gear-related mishaps? They are all situations requiring attention to detail. Each may have been the result of a moment's inattention, at the time of the crash or when evaluating the conditions beforehand and deciding to fly in them.

Having retractable landing gear is not a cause of gear up and gear collapse accidents, they are symptoms of inattention to detail. Pilot inattention may be more obvious when investigating or reading about LGRMs, but the reality is that they point out how critical a pilot's momentary loss of focus may be to a safe outcome in any type of aircraft.

**There are** *those who have,* and those who will, attempt takeoff or landing in winds beyond their ability, or fail to look outside the aircraft during taxi, or delay aborting a takeoff or going around when things aren't going right.

**Hopefully you can be one of** *those who won't* by making good weather of other risk management decisions, focusing on the task at hand from Before Start to After Shutdown, and being prepared and willing to perform a Rejected Takeoff (RTO) or go-around before impacting an obstacle or loss of control. And, **by paying attention.**

Aeronautical Charts are switching from a 6 month interval to 56 Days. Good news: data will be more accurate. Bad News: maps will go out of date faster. Meanwhile, the FAA recommends that you carry paper charts as a backup in case your electronic devices fail.

Subject: 56-Day Visual Charts

#### 56-Day Visual Charts

Beginning February 25, 2021, the FAA will issue revised visual navigation charts on every 56-Day Aeronautical Information Regulation and Control (AIRAC) date. The FAA Visual Charts will reflect the latest updates to the National Airspace System (NAS) in conjunction with other Supplement and Enroute products.

In doing so, the FAA is reducing user burden of chart updates via Chart Bulletins and lessening the numbers and duration of facility Notices to Airmen (NOTAMs). Chart users will see equal and timely NAS updates across all charts.

Like other FAA Supplement, Enroute and Terminal products, each new visual navigation chart title panel will indicate the applicable AIRAC effective date range and no longer include an edition number. An excerpt example thereof:
