

# **EAGLE'S NEST "BEARFORCE 1" SOLD**




The September meeting had a formal presentation of the change in ownership of "Bearforce 1", the product of the Eagle's Nest student aircraft builds.

# The Passing of a Houston Legend



Hank Henry 1925-2019

Wednesday, August 7, the longtime, highly recognized, West Houston Airport Chief Pilot, C.G. 'Hank' Henry passed away at the age of 94. Born on January 10, 1925, in Crossville, Tennessee, Hank was a world renowned flight instructor with over 35,000 hours of flight time most of which was instructing.

Hank learned to fly at an early age and served in World War II, as crew of the B24 while flying missions over the English Channel. He later managed the Flight Operations for an FBO in Galveston, Texas and went on to become the Chief Pilot/Test Pilot for Navion Aircraft Corporation. His stints included working as mechanic and pilot for Guinn Flying Service in Pearland, Texas. In 1973 he joined the staff at West Houston Airport where he served in various positions including Maintenance Supervisor, Charter Pilot, Certified Flight Instructor (CFI), Chief Pilot and FAA Designated Pilot Examiner.

The Homebuilt Aircraft Council (HAC) promotes and preserves the privilege of EAA members to pursue the design, construction, operation, and maintenance of homebuilt aircraft. This requires two component efforts.

- --Fostering understanding and preserving the integrity of the Majority Portion ("51%") Rule as an essential and defining regulation that permits homebuilder activities.
- --Promoting safe practices and methodologies in the design, construction, testing, operation, and maintenance of homebuilt aircraft.

The Council shall provide the collective expertise and experience necessary to analyze policies and issues, and serve in an advisory capacity to the EAA President, key staff members, and the Board of Directors.

# 302 MEMBER PLACES FIRST IN AIRVENTURE CUP

Here's one we missed in last month's issue covering the events at Airventure 2019. EAA 302 member Rich Jankowski won First in the RV Gold Class of the Airventure Cup. The AirVenture Cup Cross-Country Air Race (AVC) is the world's premier amateur open-circuit air race open to all experimental and factory-built aircraft. The AVC seeks to recreate the spirit of the great air races of the Golden Age of Aviation, such as the famed Bendix Trophy. It is held annually on the opening weekend of the EAA AirVenture Oshkosh fly-in and convention in late July, and most participants fly into Oshkosh at the race's conclusion.

The AVC has become a highly visible component of EAA AirVenture Oshkosh, and embodies the resourcefulness, inclusiveness, and volunteer spirit that are the hallmarks of both the Experimental Aircraft Association and AirVenture Oshkosh.

Rich described the race in his own words as follows:

"Note speed is from start to finish. My speed was faster than all production planes, the fastest of which was a twin Commander at 202 mph. There was a Meyers 200 that had a 550 cu. in. Continental, Bonanzas, Mooneys, and a Cirrus. Also I was faster than the RV 6, 7, and 8s. I ran that race at 75% power at 6,500'. My airplane was loaded with luggage and supplies from another racer. Basically, I was just flying for fun. The race course was from Mt. Vernon, IL, to Stevens Point, WI, with an intermediate turn point. The race is not flown till VFR conditions exist along the route of flight. Fuel stops are accommodated for airplanes that do not have adequate range."

Scholarships are required to be used within one year of the award date. The minimum award is \$5,000.

Visual Flying Note: If you follow Hwy 7 between Crockett and Centerville, at intersection of the Trinity River and Hwy. 7, airfield is 6.5 miles west. Look for WHITE OIL STORAGE TANKS on Right of Hwy 7 (See 499' tower same location on sectional chart.) Turn south one-half nm. Both runways left hand traffic. Runway 3100', 70' wide. Tree-to-tree 100 feet. Taxi only in mowed identified areas. For safety ALL aircraft must have radio contact with controller prior to entering pattern.


